Uncovering The Secret History of Pitsford Hall (part 1)

Before half-term (before I ran out of steam) I wanted to share with you one of our new clubs. Coordinated by Messrs Vié and Harrison, and led by Year 13's India Seunarayan, we have started an Archaeological Society as one of our activities. They have begun excavations in the normally out-of-bounds Walled Garden. This is immensely exciting stuff: not only is archaeology inherently fascinating







but the site upon which the school sits is one redolent with history. As I will tell anyone with almost no provocation my own academic research was focused on fifteenth century England (and Italy) so I well understand that Northamptonshire was the crucible of much of the violent, tumultuous and bloody story of your country.

I am told that when the Junior School was built Saxon remains were uncovered (which is no surprise considering the utterly magnificent Saxon All Saints' Church close by in Brixworth), so we doubtless sit on untold treasures. Of course the Saxon period of our history is many feet further underground than where we have got to so far in the dig, but in the meantime the Hall and grounds had a storied and fascinating past through the early modern and modern periods, not least the Walled Garden whose derelict glass house is a listed building in recognition of this. Much will be revealed by the research of the students. Exciting stuff and when we find cool things I will let you know.

<u>Uncovering The Secret History of Pitsford Hall (part 2)</u>

I also wanted to share with you the exciting news that our Governor and Chaplain Reverend Stephen Trott has been involved with, and is acknowledged in, the new and controversial biography of the Duke of Windsor and Wallis Simpson written by Andrew Lownie (provocatively entitled 'Traitor King') and published last month.

As many of you will know, Pitsford Hall, when it was the residence of George Drummond (former Head of Drummond's Bank, which became the NatWest Bank), was well known to the Royal Family. The late Queen Mother was a regular visitor with her husband when he was Duke of York and when he was King (and indeed they were godparents of one of Drummond's children). The Royal Family worshipped in Pitsford Church (where we have our school services) and indeed the Queen and her late sister learned to ride on the top lawn of Pitsford Hall and a summer room, sadly torn down before I became Head, was built to allow their grandmother, Queen Mary, to watch them from a warm and comfortable spot. This explains why the Queen Mother later visited the school, and even laid the foundation stone for our school library.

As Lownie's book explores, the Duke of Windsor, when he was Prince of Wales and then during his brief reign as Edward VIII, was also well-known to the Drummond family, and indeed there was more than a hint of scandal surrounding this during his time as a guest at the Hall. This only takes up a few pages of the biography, which is not at all fond of Windsor and his Baltimore-born wife, but for all of us Pitsfordians it is fascinating stuff. The sections on the hall are down to Reverend Trott's knowledge and research. Well done to him – I will say no more at this point lest any of you want to read the book for yourselves.

Sixth Form Foreign Trip

Over half-term almost half of the Sixth Form went with Mrs King, Mrs Kirk and me on our latest overseas adventure, this time to Scotland. During the visit I am told God smote Pitsford and Northamptonshire with fierce and ferocious rains, while in Scotland we had to cope with a pretty steady drizzle. The trip was a packed success, taking in museums in Glasgow and Edinburgh, as well as some good walking, Arthur's Seat and a tour of the spooky and supernatural heart of Scotland's capital (there was also shopping and cinema). The students had a great time, I caught the mother of all colds







which ruined the rest of my break, and Mrs King and Mrs Kirk are to be praised for giving up their holiday to make it happen. Well done to all.

Another National Champion from Pitsford

Speaking of well done, in the first half of this term Old Pitsfordian Ross Tait won the National Championship in Trampolining for the age group 17-21. He had already won this prize in 2019 (the pandemic stopped him defending it in 2020). Ross left school after GCSE to focus on his sport and it is wonderful to see that brave gamble paying off.

He has already represented England at international level, and he has now been selected for the GB team which will compete in the World Championships in Baku in Azerbaijan later this month. Very well done to Ross – the school and his family are most proud of his achievements.

It is remarkable how much leading sport there is at Pitsford. As well as old boys, like Ross, excelling on an international stage, we have current students who are elite golfers, horse women, athletes and footballers. Added to this, through the FCV International Football Academy, we have an FA-registered semi-professional team in school. Quite something for a wee school that punches way above its weight.

I will revisit this in more detail before Christmas as I want to share with you our students' outstanding successes.
