# From The Head



Welcome to one, welcome to all and I am pleased to share with you our latest Pitsford Post. It is designed to showcase what has come before, to set the scene for what is to follow, and to offer a flavour of life here in NN6 9AX, and I think that this copy that you have before you does this very well. 2023 has been an extraordinarily busy year so far. When King Osiwu of Northumbria called the Synod of Whitby in 664 to agree how the British would celebrate Easter I wish that he had afforded more thought to school terms to come almost fourteen hundred years later, as this year our term has been short because of where Easter falls. Despite this, we still had to fill the pot with the same amount of water and this document shows how that was done.

I was lucky enough to go and witness first hand how much the children gained from the experience and I am lucky to have staff willing to give up their time in such exhausting exercises for the good of the students. The same observation would apply to last October's extraordinary Morocco expedition as well.

I will leave my comments there, and thereby leave many of the experiences, activities, events and competitions, included in this document undeservedly unframed but in your reading you will see what a fantastically busy and engaged school we are.

And finally, as I sign off, I want to wish Mrs Heard all the best for the next stage of her career: her impact on the Junior School, and indeed all of Pitsford School, has been immense and I feel that we have moved forward faster and better than I could ever have imagined. That she managed this in the face of lockdowns and bubbles and the madness that came with them is all the more laudable.

Mrs Heard has applied for an MA in Inclusion linked to Autism, which is a parttime course, and she will also be starting a new short-term job which she hopes to do whilst studying.

During her final school assembly, the children gave Mrs Heard a thoughtful handmade leaving present and she was also presented with a voucher for a hospitality day at the Northampton Saints next season from parents and staff, which we hope she will enjoy. She will be greatly missed.

# Junior School Young Voices 23





28th February 2023

Years 3 and 4 travelled by coach to Great Missenden in Buckinghamshire on a field trip in honour of the late, great Roald Dahl. The trip began with a tour around the village, taking in sights such as the local library which was used in the book 'Matilda', and the old village garage and petrol pump station, which was the inspiration for the one described in 'Danny the Champion of the World'. Students then followed the trail out of the village to the historic Church of St Peter and St Paul, where they had the chance to visit Roald Dahl's grave.

After lunch, J3 and J4 were given a guided tour of the museum, which had a range of activities involving dressing up and playing interactive games, as well as a substantial amount of interesting possessions that belonged to Roald Dahl. This was followed by a creative writing workshop, where children were encouraged to use their ideas to describe and develop characters that they might include in their own stories.

# J6 Le Touquet Trip

At the very end of the Spring term an excited bunch of J6 children headed off on their residential visit to the Opal Coast in Northern France. During this visit the children are immersed in enriching French cultural adventures where they are able to practice their spoken French in an authentic environment. Here follows a summary of our activities!

Despite the early start, during the drive over to Calais our students visibly started to engage, the mounting excitement creating a bond within the group. After a steady ferry journey on a reasonably calm sea, we stopped at Boulogne-sur-Mer for a city walk, spotting different types of shops and exploring the Basilique Notre-Dame. It was then time to head to our hotel, the Stella Maris, for some chillout time before dinner.

Day 2 was a very busy one. It began with a trip to the market at Le Touquet, where the children were tasked with finding different items - fruits, legumes, fromages - from the stalls. Many of J6 took this opportunity for shopping, testing out their French when making purchases. We then headed off to the Chocolaterie Beussent Lachelle to see the production of a number of items, including a chocolate panda whose head was chopped off so that we could have a taste! Delicious!

We then made a stop at the Boulangerie D'Escoeuilles where the group learnt how to make artisan bread and enjoyed pain au chocolat. The illustrious Bruno 'le boulanger' will leave an indelible mark on many of us. With no rain, a stop at 'la plage' was essential. Everyone enjoyed an impromptu sandcastle building competition.



The final day took in a trip to the mind-blowing Nausicaa, the largest sea-life centre in Europe. We saw fascinating sea creatures and also some entertaining penguins! It proved to be very popular with the children spotting sharks, rays and jellyfish, not to mention some last minute spending of Euros in the gift-shop.

J6 impressed throughout this visit; their great manners, attitude, curiosity and thirst for adventure was excellent. They all displayed a lot of 'savoir vivre' and certainly acquired 'savoir faire'.



Wednesday 22nd February was "World Thinking Day", a chance for the 10 million Girl Guides and Scouts across the globe to connect. Students at the Junior School were invited to come into school dressed in their Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Beavers, Cubs or Scouts uniforms. # Art at Pitsford



The Art Department has been a hive of activity this term with students of all ages creating the most beautiful work. Although we would love to share work from all year groups, Years 11and 13 are working for their OCR qualifications and so sadly we cannot publish their work at this stage. Please do, however see some exciting work that is taking place during other year group lessons.







Year 7 have been exploring the elements of art, and it seems to have paid off remarkably well, as they have started their first 'formal' project with amazing technical prowess and confidence (which is key). They are currently sculpting some chunky birds out of clay which will be bisque fired and glazed in the most special way. See some images of stage 1 above!

Year 8 have explored Portraiture. They spent an arduous term learning about and applying the proportions of the face, and made remarkable progress demonstrated through their self-portraits. Students started the course by drawing themselves before being taught and once again after they had been taught and were all surprised by how much they had moved forward.

The next step was to explore stylisation and the students were taught how even the most abstract of imagery starts with traditional skills. They studied the work of graphic designer Luke Dixon, and created a colourful array of design self-portraits. Another triumph!





Year 9 are embarking on making their options at the moment, and have started a mini-coursework project to help them gain first hand insight into the GCSE course.

Their initial starting point is Natural Forms and will be working towards a large scale sculpture by the end of the year! Watch this space for some gorgeous images.

Year 10 have started their coursework projects and have already blown our minds with the quality of work they are producing. They are currently working on tonal drawings and coloured pencil studies, researching their individual topics. See two remarkably good examples.



Year 12 are another bunch who are exceeding our expectations in the quality department. They are exploring the more conceptual aspect of art and investigating context to support this. Included here are a few sneak peeks into their current explorations in paint and drypoint etching.

#### Junior Art Skills Club

This term we launched our very first JUNIOR ART SKILLS CLUB where 12 future artists are learning skills that will enhance their eventual qualifications.

The students are so great and arrive every Friday afternoon with determination and a thirst for knowledge. Ranging from Year 7 - 9 it is an opportunity for our younger art obsessed students to fine tune their technical skills!



Thus far they have worked in pen and ink wash, large scale charcoal drawings and coloured pencil blending. The work below is testament to the hard work and concentration they are showing at this

early stage.

We were also made aware of how vaccines are produced; more specifically we explored how the COVID-19 vaccine was able to be administered so rapidly and its effect on the future of vaccine development. We were so grateful for the opportunity to ask our questions and gain further insight into drug development. As aspiring medical students we greatly valued the knowledge we were given and the insight into corporate life.

#### Dr Poggi Presentation to the Medical Society

On Tuesday the 21st of February, the medical society had the pleasure to welcome guest speaker Dr Raffaella Poggi. Dr Poggi studied medicine and surgery in Milan, where she qualified to become a cardiovascular surgeon, she later moved to the UK. Dr Poggi is now a partner at a local general practice which accounts for 22,000 patients, alongside 3 other general practitioner doctors.

During our talk she gave us an insightful view about the medical profession and the issues she faces daily; such as having to make difficult decisions and learning how to adjust to life after the effects of corona virus. Dr Poggi talked with us about how the decisions we make in the present have a significant effect on the decisions we are able to make in later life. We also got a chance to ask ethical questions and questions surrounding getting into and studying medicine.

This talk was very insightful and inspiring, It gave aspiring doctors like myself a real outlook of what life is like to be a doctor in the NHS, today. We are immensely grateful that we had this opportunity, it allowed us to reaffirm that medicine is the career we want to do. Thank you Dr Poggi!

#### Pitsford Juniors J5 & J6 v. Quinton House

An overcast afternoon saw members of the Pitsford football club from year 5 and 6 play Quinton House at home. From the start of the game, the Blues looked strong and confident in play. Pitsford had the lion's share of possession in the first half; with centre back Alfie H making some incredible dribbling runs the length of the pitch.



By skilfully playing the ball in to James E and George S, Pitsford were soon rattling the woodwork and the Quinton defence were left floundering. After a few coordinated attacks in this manner, the Blues were rewarded with a fantastic goal from centre-forward George S. Quinton House attempted to counter attack after this first goal, but clean tackles of superb quality from defenders Jude N, Alfie H and the fearless Bella C, quickly allowed Pitsford to regain possession and counter attack.


