I am delighted to note that we did a great deal more than pass, our Inspectors left the school in raptures, loving the children and loving the culture of the school, and we were delighted to be recognised as Excellent (the highest category). I think that the staff and students deserve a great deal of praise for all that they did for that, and do every single day. Also momentous, this summer we will knock down the current Sixth Form building and build the new Centre, which should open in September. That is the first new construction since I joined the school in 2018 and it is an exciting statement of intent and confidence in the school in the midst of what is a turbulent time in the world. The school also embraced the post-pandemic world this year with our Sahara Expedition which was another powerful statement that we were back to being Pitsford: doing the brave and the exciting and the engaging to give our community the richest possible experience. The quality of this creative side of the school is incredible and, again, it is a powerful testament to the values and value of Pitsford School. I write just after the Summer Concert that many of you attended, and it was jaw-dropping in its quality and

breadth, and most importantly of all in how it distilled the unalloyed joy of our musicians finding, in Music at Pitsford, a place to create, communicate and share. Linked to that, this is the year of Joseph and his Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat, which was a triumph in every way: its scale, its invention and its quality are hard to exaggerate and the way in which it focussed the whole school in a combined, community effort was spirit-lifting. Next year is the Wizard of Oz, which promises to be as good, if not better, and with Mr Edwins now esconced in the Junior School we are looking to make more muscular the already fine drama produced there.

For a small school which lacks the numbers to have multiple teams fielded in multiple sports I am agog at the number of fixtures that we have had in all sports, and the successes accrued. In particular our elite athletes have again brought home the vegan bacon with an extraordinarily successful season crowned with a medal-laden performance at the ISA Tournament. We are punching so far above our weight in this area of school, Tyson Fury should watch out.

Our departing Class of 2023 have done themselves proud, and like the classes before them, they have left their mark on our community. From the Charity Tuck Shop, through to new initiatives in integrating with juniors and the Junior School, they have been engaged, mature and determined. I am pleased and proud of their achievements and they define what it is to be Pitsford: finding the best of themselves, igniting their passions and confidently embracing the future. Their next steps are most exciting, from the Law to Languages, through Sports Science, Medicine and Art, and beyond, to securing offers from top universities (including this year Cambridge University) the graduates of Pitsford must be applauded. That they have done so well in such trying times is heroic.

At this time, we also bid adieu to some colleagues (and this is detailed later in this august publication) but, in this message, I want to note the impact Mrs Heard made in the Junior School: she brought a great deal to the school and we are very grateful for all that she did. Her next school will be most fortunate.

When I arrived at Pitsford it was tricky: not knowing routines, making friends, unfamiliar work and timings, finding my way around...but perhaps it has been an ideal introduction as I have had opportunity to experience life as a brand new Pitsfordian, and therefore can totally empathise with the new children who arrive. All of these areas of school life, now feel a lot more familiar and whilst the 'honeymoon' period is definitely over I do hope to cultivate a long and lasting relationship with Pitsford. The Junior School has been a hive of activity and 'buzzy-ness' and we have finally reached the end of a very full term. We have had the silent disco, class assemblies, outdoor cinema, Space Centre trip, Pitsford Play, a coronation tea party, Thrapston water sports days, Condover Hall residential, activity week, Moving Up Day, a very wet Sports Day, the J5 & J6 play – Did the Butler Do It?, the J6 Leavers' programme – walk, pizza party – and the whole school slip slide. It has been great to meet some of the wonderful community of parents and to take the pulse of what is a thriving Junior School, watching it in action and listening to the views of all stakeholders. Fundamentally we have a wonderful setting, a dedicated team of staff, and children of whom we are immensely proud. However, we are still looking to develop and, to coin a phrase, seeking evolution, rather than revolution.

So what does next year hold in store? We will continue to provide fixtures for all children to participate in, running an A and a B team wherever possible, promoting pride in being chosen to wear the Pitsford colours. Our sport offering will be extended in terms of swimming with all children from EYFS through to J6 receiving a swimming lesson once a week. We are actively promoting the performing arts from our existing Musical Theatre tie-in with the senior school, to a collaborative whole school approach to our annual school production (The Wizard of Oz next year!), curriculum drama lessons will be introduced for every child in the school and the option of individual 1:1 LAMDA lessons will be available. Additionally, the continuation of curriculum dance lessons and optional ballet/street dance will be on offer after school. We are excited to announce that every class, from EYFS through to J6, will have a dedicated outdoor/Forest School lesson each week (whatever the weather!) as we teach the children about husbandry and make use of the terrific grounds that we have available. This is just our starting point, a comprehensive and wide ranging offer that will grow and develop over time.

The Junior School is a place where the children work hard and they play hard. It is a place where we make each day count. It is a place where we encourage risk taking, stepping out of comfort zones and embracing effort. Where potential is recognised and directed as each child makes the most of every opportunity, where each child – regardless of their starting point – can realise more than they could possible imagine.



Leaving Pitsford in torrential rain on Tuesday 20th June left the Year 7's feeling a bit pessimistic about completing their fieldwork and we were very grateful to the National Trust for letting us use their covered area at the Longshore Estate to do our initial learning. Of course, all Year 7 really wanted to do was play on the rocks, so we were delighted when the weather broke enough to allow us to get up on the moor for a bit of weasling- a cross between scrambling, bouldering and caving. Great for building confidence, strength, balance. teamwork good judgement. It's all about supporting each other and working together- and Year 7 did us proud. Thank you Blue Mountain Adventure - and of course to Mr Lewis from organising this (sandwiched between three weekends of Duke of Edinburgh expeditions). Mr Lewis really must like his rocks and landscapes to give up so much of his time to share this passion with the pupils.

A spectacular day yesterday in what must be one of the most beautiful landscapes in Britain. The Year 10 Geographers were completing a field study on Hathersage Moor to understand the ways in which a landscape has changed over time. Burbage Brook is studied yearly by Pitsford School so we can see changes in the data as a legacy of one year to another. You can see from the photos why this small stream has been designated as a SSSI and why our data was to be collected at specific locations and under the strict guidance of environmental ethics. The couples picnicking on the banks of the brook also enjoyed Mr Lewis' explanations and conversing with the children about the methodology they were using. Our pupils were as polite and charming as ever.

Pitsford School was lucky enough to be picked by Historic Royal Palaces (who run and operate Hampton Court Palace). Year 8 and Pitsford School History teachers Mr Harrison and Mrs Davies set out by coach early Tuesday morning, packed lunches in hand. When we arrived, we were taken back by the majesty and opulence of Hampton Court Palace which was first built by Henry VIII's chief minister, the infamous Cardinal Thomas Wolsey.

In 1838, Queen Victoria opened the palace to the public. Thanks to Queen Victoria, Year 8 got to experience the beautiful architecture and ornate quality of life enjoyed by English monarchs. Our first workshop gave us a guided tour of many of the state rooms and halls, with a focus on the changes in religion experienced during the Tudor period. Our second workshop saw two teams compete against each other in a heated debate over the succession crisis on the death of Edward VI and Mary I. All of the tour guides commented on our students' fantastic attitude to learning and their excellent behaviour. We hope to win this competition again next year, so we can experience this wonderful educational trip with our new Year 8's next year.
